Taverham Sixth Form Virtual Work Experience

Despite not being able to successfully secure an ‘in-person’ work experience placement, this booklet is designed to ensure that you still get the benefits of work experience opportunities. Work experience is a really valuable opportunity as it allows students to:

- get an insight into a job role or career that you may be interested in (or one that you didn't know you might be interested in!)
- get personal experience that will directly support a post-sixth form application
- develop transferrable skills that employers and university admission tutors find valuable
- get specific examples of experiences that can be discussed in a personal statement, job application or interview
- develop confidence and self-esteem
- show you are proactive and embrace opportunities

In Taverham Sixth Form, we don't want any students to be at a disadvantage and miss out on the many benefits work experience can bring. We have therefore devised a condensed programme of activities that you can engage with during the course of work experience week. You can tailor the programme to suit your interests, career goals, time and other enrichment commitments, both inside and outside school.

To make it a beneficial experience, you need to consider what you want to achieve from your work experience programme. Use the box below to write some goals, indicating what you would like to achieve.

Work Experience Goals

You will be expected to complete **25 hours** of work experience activities by the end of the week. A variety of activity suggestions below have each been given a time value to help you reach the total.

Your progress will be monitored by Ms Reding and you will need to **provide evidence of completion** of your activities. This may be a completion certificate, session notes or screenshots of what you have been involved in, as well as the reflection table at the end of this booklet.

Registers will be taken in the Sixth Form Study Centre at the start of each period. No home study is to be taken during the week.

The first activity is compulsory for everyone as it provides a very good overview to make sure you make the most of the programme. This will be emailed directly to you at the start of the week. You can then create a programme that best fits your needs using some of the examples below.

Please note that this is not an exhaustive list of opportunities. You can, therefore, log other activities that reflect a work experience opportunity. This should be above and beyond any paid employment that you currently do to broaden your experience.

You may also still independently arrange face-to-face work experience with an employer later on in your studies. This would be strongly recommended for highly competitive courses such as veterinary science, dentistry and medicine. Once arranged, please provide a letter of confirmation from the workplace to Mrs Robertson and notify your form tutor.

Log these skills in your Competencies tool.</p> <p>What is a MOOC? Make a note of at least 3 reasons why a MOOC could support an apprenticeship or university application.</p> <p>Describe a time when you have faced a challenge and overcome it. How did this help you build skills in resilience?</p>	Approximately 1 hour
Unifrog – Apprenticeship Jump Start	
<p>Read the 'University vs. Apprenticeship' guide. Find 2 pros and 2 cons for each side.</p> <p>Find a business apprenticeship near you that offers a degree level qualification. What salary does it offer?</p> <p>Create an Apprenticeship shortlist.</p> <p>Use the Know-How Library to read 'Degree Apprenticeships and why you should take them'. What are the advantages of completing a degree apprenticeship?</p> <p>Go to the Apprenticeships section of the Know-How Library and read 'Higher Apprenticeships, Degree Apprenticeships and School Leaver Programmes'. What are the differences between these options?</p> <p>Find a career that has an apprenticeship route into it. Make a note of at least 3 interesting facts about that career.</p>	Approximately 1 hour
Unifrog – World of Work Jump Start	
<p>Find and name the skills required to be a newspaper or magazine editor.</p> <p>Use the Careers Library to find an unusual career within the NHS – not something obvious! Make a note of at least 3 interesting facts about that career.</p> <p>Use the Careers Library to find out the starting salary for an architect. What would a highly experienced architect get paid in comparison to this.</p> <p>Go to the Know-How Library and into the World of Work section. Read the article 'How to work out your take home pay'.</p> <p>Search for a career that interests you in the Careers Library. Make a note of at least 3 interesting facts about that career. What qualifications would you need to get into that career?</p> <p>Use the Careers Library to find a career with a starting salary that is between £20,000 and £30,000. What are the UK prospects (the amount of projected jobs in the future) for that job?</p> <p>Find, and conduct some research on, an unusual career within the Armed Forces using the Careers Library.</p> <p>Use the Know-How Library to research how to interview like a boss. What four steps should you follow?</p> <p>In the Know-How Library, read and watch the 'Acing your CV' guide and video. Make a note of the top tips.</p>	Approximately 1 hour
